

BURUNDI Paul Nsanzurwimo, civil servant

Paul Nsanzurwimo was released unconditionally on 14 March 2001. He was not tortured or ill-treated.

He had been detained for five days in a gendarmeric special detention centre, the Brigade spéciale de recherche (RSP), in the capital, Buiumhura, where he was at risk of torture








WORLD REGIONS VIOLATIONS AND OUTCOMES




WORLD REGIONS TIMELINE




WORLD REGIONS TIMELINE






